

Mains'l Services' College Plus is a year-round program that provides individual support and assistance to young adults with disabilities who are interested in pursuing a college degree or academic certificate. Lead by Program Coordinator, Betty Carlson, College Plus provides learners with individualized support in the areas of academics, independent living, socialization, and vocation. Together, the student and instructor set

Social Skills, including developing and maintaining friendships and pursuing leisure interests and hobbies. *Independent Living Skills*, including maintenance of a clean, well-kept home, nutrition basics, and money management. *Vocational Skills*, including resume development, networking skills, and application and interview training, as well as seeking volunteer opportunities.

Students start as freshmen, and move up a tiered system. At each level, they receive hourly supports, based on the individual's need. Support hours are decreased as they gain independence. There is a screening process to make sure the College Plus Program is a good match with the student. Students must complete a detailed application. Some of the application requirements include their high school transcript, current IEP, a letter of interest by both the student and their family, a list of goals and a letter of recommendation.

As the student achieves goals in each area, new goals are set. If a student shows slow or no progress on a specific goal, it is reviewed and revised to move forward and be successful. Academic supports are provided at the college; the independent living supports are offered in the participant's home; and the vocational and



realistic, attainable goals in each area:

social skills are provided in various integrated, community-based settings. Students increase their independence by learning to access and utilize transportation.

Students can expect to leave the College Plus program with a set of core skills and experiences to maximize their strengths and talents. Successful learners will have developed a set of skills to improve the quality of their lives, equip them for independent living, and move them towards competitive employment.


Lending Library

Coverage for Behavioral Health Treatments to Start July 1, 2012

On October 9, 2011 California Govenor Jerry Brown signed Senate Bill SB.946, making California the 28th state to enact autism insurance reform. SB.946 will require coverage of proven behavioral treatment therapies for autism starting in July 2012.

Authored by Senator Steinberg, SB.946 clarifies settlements negotiated by the Brown administration last summer with two major health plans that behavioral health treatments, such as applied behavior

analysis (ABA), are eligible benefits with no caps on age or amount of benefits.

The law will take effect July 1, 2012. By virtue of the early intervention provided through ABA, California taxpayers are expected to save \$140 million a year in special education and social service costs, according to an independent analysis by the California Health Benefits Review Program. In addition, the improved access to ABA therapy could create at least 20,000 new jobs.

Thousands of California families, in the absence of insurance coverage, have been forced to pay out-of-pocket or rely on taxpayer-funded programs for behavioral health treatments, which can cost \$50,000 a year or more. Our newsletter is published by:

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In Memory of Bob Heron


On Friday, December 9th, we lost our good friend, Bob Heron. Bob was a kind, intelligent, caring husband, father and friend.

Arc Adult Day Programs Offer Many Opportunities to Adults with Disabilities in Butte County

The Arc Adult Day Program offers a variety of educational, recreational, social and vocational opportunities to adults with disabilities in Butte County. They have two sites, one in Chico, one in Oroville, and soon they will have a third site, in Paradise. Participants are involved in activities both on site and in the community. These activities are designed to promote self-esteem, independence and social awareness.

Through their Work Readiness Program, consumers receive on-the-job training at the Arc thrift stores in Chico and Oroville. There they learn valuable work related skills while earning money.

On a daily basis, consumers are offered different community outing opportuni-

ties. They have enjoyed trips to the Tree Farm, Chico State, Chico Mall and Chico Museum, to name a few. At the end of the week they have "Fun Friday," which includes outings to different restaurants, dances at the Pavilion, pizza parties, monthly birthday parties and musical entertainment from the community.

The Arc hosts an annual Fashion Show in which the consumers are the models. There are consumer talent shows and D.J. parties that boasts one of the consumers, "D.J. RTC," a perennial favorite.

Along with all this, Arc offers many classes on many topics from arts and crafts, physical fitness and gardening to Spanish, math, computers and everything in between.

The program's Associate Director, Nelson Corwin says "In summary, working with the developmentally disabled population has enriched my life in ways I could not imagine when I was working in employment not related to this field. I have been personally enriched by the disabled population's generosity, openness, eagerness to learn, helping with other clients and the positive attitude the majority of clients bring with them to the program on a daily basis."



NANCY MCGIE ESTATE PLANNING PRESENTATION

On November 10, Autism LifeSpan was pleased to host an educational session on the topic of limited conservatorship with local attorney Nancy McGie. Nancy engaged the audience of approximately 20 members in a highly interactive session. The event was held at our Kids & Kitchen Classroom in Chico.

The purpose of limited conservatorship is to protect adults with developmental disabilities from harm or exploitation while allowing for the development of maximum self-reliance.

A conservatorship is a legal proceeding where one person, called the "conservator" is appointed by a judge to manage the affairs of another person called the "conservatee." The law prefers that a family member of the individual be appointed conservator. However, the court can appoint non-relatives, professional conservators, government agencies and nonprofit corporations.

Nancy made it clear that a limited conservatorship is not required merely because a person has a developmental disability. A limited conservatorship is appropriate only when necessary to protect the well-being of the individual. It is designed to encourage the development of maximum self-reliance and independence of the individual.

A limited conservatorship gives the conservator only certain specified powers, and allows the conservatee to retain rights that he/she is able to exercise. In this kind of conservatorship, the regional center will receive notice of the petition and will file an advisory report with the court on the appropriateness of the conservatorship.

If the main objective is the management of the funds of a person with a developmental disability, Nancy made it clear that a Special Needs Trust can often better meet those objectives.
